Worry vs. Thanks? Bet on THANKS GIVING!

It's one of my favorite verses in the whole Bible: "Don't worry about anything, but in everything by prayer and supplication [humble asking] with thanksgiving let your requests be made known to God. And the peace of God which passes all understanding will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus." (Philippians 4:6-7)

Worry sucks me in! I'm naturally a bit of a pessimist and also a perfectionist, so when I face uncertain decisions, I feel fear and pressure. Not long ago, negotiating the changes we're making this fall for Sunday morning family faith formation (what used to be Sunday School), would have tied me up in knots. So I welcome Paul's command (at least, I hear it as command and as permission) not to worry about *anything*.

Jesus said it, too: "Therefore, I tell you, do not worry about your life, what you shall eat or what you will drink, or about your body, what you will wear. Is not life more than food and the body more than clothing?" (Matthew 6:25)


Heading into the holidays, these words are great permission not to stress about Turkey-Day or Christmas Dinner or any of the rest of the season's festivities. They're permission not to worry about who gets what and how much we have to spend. Life IS more than food and clothing, after all.

Don't worry about anything, but pray about everything with thanksgiving, Paul continues. God, teach me to pray out EVERYTHING that bugs me! Teach me to talk to you on the front end—and if I need a real, physical ear, send me to a friend who can help me to trust.

God, please teach me and my friends at Faith Lutheran to pray with such hope and expectation and confidence that we offer you our sincere thanks. And let Thanksgiving strengthen our confidence, brighten our hope, and bring smiles to our faces. Thank you, Lord God, that your servant Paul could call us to rejoice with confidence in your love and power even from a stinking Roman prison cell.

Thank you, Lord Jesus, for shepherding us into fun and effective family faith formation. Thank you for drawing every member of our gathering closer as they seek to know you more. Thank you that your will for justice and peace and provision and care is acted out in and through each of us everywhere and every day. Thank you that your kingdom is coming to us, to all. Amen and Amen.

Hopeful Hint: For a great pick-me-up, read all of Philippians or AT LEAST Philippians 4:4-9 early and often. Take Paul's advice. Remember Paul was sick and in prison when he wrote these words. He's a credible writer on hope and peace in tough times.


My Faith-Full Thanksgiving list...

Freedom in Christ Prison Ministry in Crisis


Friends of Freedom in Christ should know: as of its October council meeting, this ministry of the Montana Synod inside the walls at Deerlodge projected enough income to continue only through the end of 2014.

Freedom in Christ's leaders ask all supporters to consider extra giving through this winter and beyond. Operating expenses have been exceeding income by about \$2000 per month in FiC's roughly \$100,000/year budget, which goes largely to support Pr. Rob Nedbalek in full time ministry there. This ministry was begun through the efforts of Pastor Greg Karlsgodt

among others. Faith members Barb Davis and John Trangmoe have been faithful advocates in our congregation, and FiC is supported solidly through Faith's own mission support giving (your offerings through our church).

If this ministry is close to your heart, now's the time to chip in to keep it going.

Kids' Time Comes to Sunday Worship

September's conversations and October's experiments are bearing fruit! Many, many thanks to the terrific parents and other caring adults who are helping move our Sunday morning faith-formation for families into its next stage! You've asked great questions, made helpful observations, worked hard, and been soooo patient.

For now we'll call it Kids' Time: Youngsters preschool through 5th grade are invited (not required) to enjoy a song and message just for them in the worship service, then head out to enjoy small group Gospel learning at their own level.

During November and December, all our kids are also invited to stay after worship to practice for the *Kids'* Christmas Worship on Sunday, Dec. 14, 9:30am. Preschoolers can enjoy the nursery (staffed with older youth earning camp/youth gathering \$) during Kids' Time, then split off with Nancy Osborn after church while middle and big kids stick with Celeste in the sanctuary. *Middle and High Schoolers* are *welcome* to help out with any of these groups!

Preschoolers are still a bit of a question. Teachers notice it takes more time and consistency to serve this age-level well. I see that along with the usual moms and dads, some super grandmas are bringing grandkids to church, and I wonder if we might find enough folks to give the first 45 minutes of worship to teaching our preschoolers on a rotating basis. Maybe this group's leaders could even gather for a monthly daytime check-in, planning session, and time of prayer for our kids and grandkids. Talk to me if you have comments or suggestions—and I'll be talking to you!

In January, the world changes again when gymnastics, basketball, and ski season begin. Our new materials from Augsburg's Sparkhouse Online, are easy to adapt to smaller classes and larger age groups, and parents can use them to take family faith-formation on the road.

Thanks for sticking with it! Good folks are doing great work, and our kids and families are growing closer to God and each other for real life. The ride will get bumpy, but the bumpiest roads go to the BEST places. Keep trying different seats on the bus till you find what fits—we won't strap you in! If you've got a seat in mind, please volunteer to Mark Livesay or to me. Keep bringing questions and suggestions. Pray and give thanks: God isn't finished with us yet!

So what is CASA? CASA stands for Court Appointed Special Advocates, carefully screened and highly-trained volunteers whose sole responsibility is to speak for the best interests of children, who get swept into the local justice system through no action of their own, in cases that may involve abuse, neglect, or even exploitation. These volunteers are appointed as "guardian ad litem," meaning one who speaks on behalf of another, and are sworn in as officers of the court. A CASA volunteer provides the ongoing attention of an adult, "who has no ax to grind." It is the CASA volunteer's job to listen to what the child wants, evaluate the possible options, and present his or her recommendation to a judge.



Paracords for Warmth



Last school year, I got a phone call from a mother of another child in Luken's class. She was upset because her kids were cold and she didn't have the means to keep them warm in their own home. I gathered up what spare blankets I could find, took the space heater from my bedroom and loaded up the items into my car. I drove to her house and found all her children huddled together under blankets on the couch. The house was so cold that the pipes kept freezing. The children couldn't stay warm in their own beds so they were all on the couch trying to use each other's body heat to stay warm. The scene broke my heart.

I know that this wasn't the only family struggling; our house was cold. Not dangerously cold but cold enough to where we all wore extra clothes and closed off parts of the house we didn't frequent. We heated Luken's room, and the rest of our living area we just heated enough to not shiver. Even cutting back so much, it took me until July to catch up on my power bill.

In talking with Luken over the summer, he told me that he wanted to do something to make the world a better place. He went through a dozen or so grand ideas complete with dragons and ninjas and huge indoor airports constructed of legos. Not wanting to shoot down his zest for helping others, I suggested he do something to help people who live near where we live. "Oh, like buying cold people blankets so they can be warm!" was his response. Thus started the *Paracords for Warmth* Project.

What is the Paracords for Warmth Project? I priced out paracord and buckles, ordered a bunch of different colors and started cutting and tying bracelets. Each bracelet costs about \$2 in supplies to make. Luken has been selling them for \$3. That gives him \$1 for each bracelet sold to go toward his goal of raising \$500 to buy blankets and new space heaters to give to people who are at risk for being cold this winter. He has set Christmas as his end time.

Many people have purchased these bracelets. Kids love them because they are kinda cool looking and many kids can afford a \$3 item. Adults like them because they feel like it's an easy way to help a kid make a difference. Adults often pitch in a few more bucks for their bracelets. Any additional funds go toward the project goal.

I set up a page on Facebook for Luken's project. It's called <u>*Paracords for Warmth Project*</u>. People can go to that page and order (bracelets, key fabs, awareness ribbons) by messaging me. I will deliver local orders and mail orders to people who live out of the area. The buyer pays shipping.

Since we started this project in August, Luken has made \$117 toward his goal of \$500. I'm very proud of him for wanting to do something to make a difference. I'm even more proud that he has actually taken action to make that difference.

Why am I telling you? Because I want your help. I need help getting the word out. I'd love it if the church would host a blanket drive so people who have extra blankets crowding closets can donate them to this project to be given to people who are at risk of being cold. These are a few of my ideas. If you have thoughts or ideas on how Luken and I can better get the word out and get people wanting to be involved, I welcome them.

I am pretty excited about this project and think that a goal of \$500 is quite reasonable. I welcome help and input from Luken's church community.

Operation Christmas Child – Be a Part of It!



HIGHLIGHTS FROM FLBC'S ANNUAL MEETING

FLBC's annual meeting and delegates' retreat was held at the camp on October 3rd and 4th. Pastor Brenda and Celeste & Rod Pogachar attended the meeting.

A brief summary of the meeting:

- A **Strategic Planning Committee was formed.** The twelve members will meet several times in the next year, with the goal of creating a long-term plan and mission statement for the camp. This will aid with grant applications and provide accountability to the "shareholders"- the 55 congregations (including us!) that own the camp.
- Pastor Brenda was elected to the FLBC board
- The number of campers onsite has dipped slightly since the peak year of 2008, due to economic conditions and so forth. Faith had a record number of youth attending camp this summer: 23! (There were only 2 congregations in the state with higher numbers) Campership registrations cover only 60% of the cost of a child who attends camp. The extra 40% is made up through fundraising (grants and donations). Congregations are asked to contribute \$5/ per confirmed member. Please consider becoming a member of the FLBC Partners' Club (donation of at least \$150/ year). Thanks to those who directed their Thrivent Choice Dollars to the camp.
- FLBC's Day Camp (aka VBS) Ministry is thriving, with counselors traveling to 22 Montana congregations, and reaching nearly 1000 children. Faith's VBS in July had a record number of children attending.
- **FLBC is looking for ways to grow the camp ministry** through year-round retreats. We brainstormed ways to attract grown-ups by offering a variety of programming options. Many of the cabins have very nice accommodations (heat and indoor plumbing!)
- Summer Camp Brochures will be available in December (I'll keep you posted). New camps this year include: Cooking, Grandparents/Grandchild (for those children younger than 3rd grade), and Advanced Backpacking. Choir camp has been retooled to include music, art and drama.
- The new **Gathering Pavilion was dedicated** in a ceremony at the close of the meeting. Keep in mind that this beautiful facility can be used for family reunions, etc. (The camp is available for rent on weekends during the summer, too!)




