



What is Maundy Thursday? What Does "Maundy" Mean?

The story that takes us from death to life begins on Maundy Thursday. The night before Jesus was crucified, he had a Passover supper with his disciples. (*Passover is a Jewish holy day that celebrates God's deliverance of the Israelites from their slavery in Egypt.*) During the Passover meal, Jesus took <u>bread and wine</u> and asked his Father to bless it. He broke the bread into pieces, gave it to his disciples and said, "Take and eat; this is my body, given for you. Do

this for the remembrance of me." Then he took the cup of wine, shared it with his disciples and said, "This cup is the new covenant in my blood, shed for you and for all people for the forgiveness of sin. Do this for the remembrance of me." These events recorded in Luke 22:19-20 describe the Last Supper and form the biblical basis for the practice of Communion.

After supper, Jesus knew that this would be his final opportunity to instruct his disciples before the crucifixion, so he talked at length about his purposes, what his followers should do in response, and the promise of the Holy Spirit to come. The story of the last supper in John's gospel recalls a remarkable event not mentioned elsewhere; in an incredible demonstration of humility and servant hood, Jesus performed the duty of a slave by washing his disciples' feet, and urged them to do the same for one another.

The word *Maundy* (pronounced *mawn*-dee) comes from the Latin word *mandatum*, which means "**moderate or command**." The command that this holy day refers to is the one that Jesus gave to his disciples during the Last Supper:

A new commandment I give to you, that you love one another, just like I have loved you; that you also love one another. *John 13:34*



Easter Scholarship Brunch





Till It Feels Good

I want everyone to stop for a moment and think of what it would mean to not have our church to worship at or our congregation to worship with....

What does that mean for you?

For me, I would be terribly sad. I have only been worshiping at Faith for 1 ¹/₂ years and have already come to know this as my soft place to fall, my place to come and get centered for my week ahead. My place to see God smiling back at me in many of the faces I see each week. My place to let go of my troubles, my place to hear what I need to hear.

If any of you agree, then you need to Dig Deep and give more.

Now I share my experience with you: When I was 36 years old, I was a single mom, divorced with two children: A daughter in 3^{rd} grade and a son in 2^{nd} grade. I was barely keeping my head above water financially. I was in the process of buying a vehicle and trying to figure out what kind of car payment I could afford. I figured I could afford \$50.00 a month.

I settled with the car salesman at \$36.00 a month. I was frightened. My dear friend said that every time I went thru a drive thru or received change back from purchasing anything to put it in my ashtray and at the end of the month deposit it and put it towards my truck payment. To my surprise it worked. It kept me focused on saving.

Over the years this way of saving has been part of our family lives.

I'll bet most of you have a change jar.

We keep ours in our kitchen and have already used it for various adventures. We as a family have decided to give our jar of money to Faith.

We have also adjusted some other spending that we do and are adding an extra \$20.00 a week.

I am challenging you all to prayerfully consider doing the same. I think this Little Church of ours is worth our efforts to keep the lights on.

Dig Deep and give until it feels good.

Lenten Baskets of Promise

This Lent, Faith is proud to once again partner with Lutheran World Relief's Baskets of Promise campaign. We have been collecting different items each week during Lent and will be assembling our Personal Care Kits on April 3rd.



When natural disasters strike or political conflict flares, families often don't have time to gather their belongings before fleeing. The Personal Care Kits provide them with things to help them stay healthy and they are a way of showing them that there are people who care about them.

The items that go in to each kit include: 2 bars of 4 to 5 oz. soap in the original wrapping, a light-weight dark colored bath towel no bigger than 52" x 27", an adult size toothbrush in its original packaging, a sturdy comb, and metal nail clippers. We cannot add other items or leave out any of the items listed. Toothpaste will be added to the kits when they arrive at the LWR warehouse.





Judy Griffin: Steward of Outreach.



Faith Lutheran Church Sabbatical Leave for Pastors

Following Montana Synod guidelines and at the recommendation of its Mutual Ministry Committee, the Faith Lutheran Church Council instituted the following Sabbatical Leave Policy in 2000. It was revised to its present edition in 2007:

603 Paid Sabbatical Leave- FLC Personnel Handbook

1. The rostered person (pastor) is eligible for an extended sabbatical leave of 12 weeks (3 months) after serving FLC for six years. Six months prior approval of this leave by the FLC council will be necessary.

- 2. While on sabbatical leave, FLC will provide full pay and benefits as per the current year's budget.
- 3. One year of service is expected after completion of the study leave.

4. A fully detailed explanation of this policy should be obtained by the rostered person from the FLC council before asking for approval for leave.

Pastor Steve Van Gilder was the first pastor from FLC to use this educational and spiritual renewal opportunity. FLC council initiated this conversation with Pastor Brenda several months ago and all proper steps have been and are being followed.





Deepen Faith and Witness—Forgiveness

"Forgive us our sins, as we forgive those who sin against us." When the disciples asked Jesus to teach them to pray, he also taught them to forgive. Forgiveness is an essential faith practice. And, like so many of the faith practices, it is not a one-way street. We must learn over and over to ask for forgiveness, to grant forgiveness, and to receive forgiveness.

One of extraordinary outcomes of the shootings at the Mother Emanuel AME Church in Charleston, South Carolina in June was that the families of the victims all came forward and stated that they forgave the shooter. They forgave the young man who violated their sacred space, who took advantage of their hospitality, and murdered their loved ones, including their pastor. They forgave him publicly. And America was dumbfounded. Because such forgiveness is not part of our "we're #1," "winning is everything," "don't get mad, get even!" culture.

We saw it a decade earlier when a man went into an Amish school in Pennsylvania and shot a number of girls. The families of those beloved children said, no, they would not seek the death penalty. Instead they forgave the man. And America was shocked.

Forgiveness is counter-cultural. And while Christians are not the only ones who preach and practice forgiveness as a central part of who we are, forgiveness is integral to our faith. After all, we are the people who follow the crucified Christ, who near the moment of his death asked for forgiveness for his tormentors. "Father, forgive them, for they know not what they do."

In worship we regularly ask for God's forgiveness. And we receive the assurance of the forgiveness with the absolution given by the pastor. And just as Jesus taught us to love God with all our being, and neighbor as ourself, getting into right relationship with God requires getting into right relationship with our neighbor. And that means asking for, receiving, and granting forgiveness.

I suspect that each of us is better at one of the three aspects of forgiveness. I know people who are great at saying "Sorry," but not so great at hearing it from others. I know people who believe fervently that God forgives all kind of others, but are so sure if they, really, are part of it. Forgiveness is all three—asking, receiving and granting. It is all part of the same faith practice that connects us more closely with God.

Forgiveness does not mean there are no consequences. A convicted murderer still has to be accountable for his or her actions. And saying you are sorry for something you have done does not mean that the problem will go away. It is simply the start of right relationship. Not everybody is in the same place as those Amish families in Pennsylvania, those AME families in South Carolina. We cannot force people to forgive us. We can only ask.

Even time we bring our Apology to the Tribes to another tribal council, we have to be prepared that they will not accept our Apology, that they will say it is too little, too late. Or worse. Each time we have been relieved and deeply touched at how seriously the tribal council took our Apology, how respectful they were to us and our need to seek forgiveness.

I was in college at the height of the "Love Story" fever. You could get key chains, posters and other paraphernalia with the movie's most memorable quote, "Love means never having to say you're sorry." The author happened to be a junior professor on campus in the Classics Department. One day in a class on Tragedy, a senior professor took a break from Aeschylus and Dostoyevsky and Melville and burst out, "Young Eric has just got it all wrong! Of course you have to say you're sorry!" He was right, of course.




