




Faith's Summer Worship



With thanks and joy we welcome Bryce & Connie Satter and Stu & Bonnie Savory into Faith's membership!



Kogudus Retreat at Woman's Prison September 23rd-25th


Jesus was drawn to people who were sick, oppressed, poor, and rejected by others. As his followers we are called to carry on his ministry to the least, the last, and the lost...the marginalized, those our society generally despises or would like to ignore. Those who are serving time in prison fit that description; and, yet, when we Christians on the outside dare to spend time with them at a retreat we find that our common bond in Christ creates inspiration and encouragement for all of us. Kogudus Renewal Ministry has been offering retreats at Montana Women's Prison in Billings since 2011. The next

2016 Montana Synod Assembly Highlights June 3-5, Billings

Faith's Voting Delegates: Celeste and Rod Pogachar

Theme: Montana Synod's third benchmark: "Deepen Faith and Witness"

This year's conference was a **theological conference**, meaning that there was little business transacted, but many workshops. Most workshops were focused on ways to commemorate the 500th anniversary of the Reformation (2017), and the tremendous impact it has had on the world. Other workshops were on topics like world hunger, like disaster preparedness, like working with young adults.

Business: We adopted a resolution on the repudiation of the Doctrine of Discovery, moving towards more justice for Native Americans. A new pastor was ordained (Tonia Fisher), almost 30 new lay pastoral associates (LPAs) were recognized, including Kaye VanGilder. A new Christikon director was installed (Pastor Mark McDonald). The 2017 budget was approved. Approximately \$1.1 million. 40% of that is given to worldwide ministries of the ELCA.

Keynote speakers: Dr. Mary Jane Haemig spoke on the impact of the and Witness reformation in today's world. Churchwide representative Pr. Kevin Strickland guided the Assembly through a process of identifying priorities for the ELCA for the future and gave an overview of the various good works happening throughout the world on behalf of the ELCA. He thanked Montanans for their generosity.

Pastor Arne Berglund gave an update on the progress of the Synod House (new synod offices in Great Falls). A fundraising campaign was initiated several years ago, and although not all of the money has been raised, construction will begin next summer. The old building has been sold, so the offices will move temporarily to New Hope Church. Construction costs will be significantly reduced by using Mission Builders and providing workers from around the synod (like you! no experience necessary!)

Deepen Faith

The following brief overview of Pastor Brenda's sabbatical was announced Sunday, June 5th:

As you are all aware Pastor Brenda will begin her 3month sabbatical June 15th. A substantial amount of planning has gone into this, not only by Pastor but also the Council, staff and congregation.

As the MT Synod puts it, wholeness and wellness are important principles in the life of the church and in the practice of its ministry. A sabbatical can, if planned properly, strengthen that. We here at Faith, recognize that as well. And that during a sabbatical a Pastor separates himself/herself completely from the congregation physically, mentally and emotionally.

A sabbatical provides not only rest from labor, but also opportunities for more in-depth learning and renewal. It allows a Pastor to refine and update their professional skills and refresh their spiritual life and calling. A time for change and renewal for both the Pastor and the congregation. The sabbatical will allow for a period of time away from normal ministerial responsibilities in order to spend an extended period of time in study, learning and reflection. Pastor Brenda has noted she will be attending a special workshop at Luther Seminary "Daring Way for Faith Leaders" in late June. We look forward to her sharing that, among her other endeavors, on her return to us.

This Pastoral sabbatical will also be an opportunity for our congregation to strengthen and improve OUR ministry. Both congregations and their pastors and staff actually need sabbaticals from each other, and both can benefit from some time spent apart. Pastors and Church leaders should not see the sabbatical as a reward for good work or simply a benefit to keep the Pastor happy. Neither should they view it as an extension of the normal vacation period. Rather it should be an important part of the program of the church and the working relationship between the church and its pastors from which both will draw benefits.

Returning from a sabbatical may be more difficult than going on one. It may be difficult to get back in touch with the total situation all at once. Consider an adjustment period when returning. While advance planning was necessary for embarking on the sabbatical, it is no less important for returning from it.

Pastor, we look forward to your written and oral report(s) on your return in mid September as you reconnect with us. And may you return with renewed energy and perhaps rediscovered zeal for ministry.

The following was announced Sunday (June 12th), Pastor's last Sunday before her sabbatical:

I spoke quite extensively on Pastor's upcoming sabbatical noting information from ELCA and MT ELCA's guidelines/recommendations. It should have gone in the June Faith Herald, but yours truly, missed the deadline.

We recognize that a sabbatical rest is much more than a vacation. It is a rest with a purpose.

Your church Council sends their blessings to you as you begin your 3 month sabbatical Wed., June 15th. We will all miss you. It will be different and yes, challenging, around here without you. But we know you are grateful and realize you have a committed and hardworking Staff and Council that will be forging ahead taking care of Faith's business with God's guidance.

Try not to worry (too much) about your congregation, just include us in your prayers, because you can be assured you will be in ours! May God richly bless you as you use your time away for rest and renewal and may God continue to bless our congregation!

PB's Sabbatical Saga: Midsummer Adventures

One of the highlights of my time away this summer is a trip to the Twin Cities for "The Daring Way for Faith Leaders" workshop at Luther Seminary in St. Paul. Based on the work of Brené Brown, this experience is meant to build strength, joy, and resilience in the lives of ministry professionals and their congregations.

A sample of Brown's findings (she's a research sociologist) from The Gifts of Imperfection (© 2010) speaks to the gifts of Sabbath for all of us:



If we want to live a Wholehearted life, we have to become intentional about cultivating sleep and play, and about letting go of exhaustion as a status symbol and productivity as self-worth.

Making the choice to rest and play is, at best, counterculture. The decision to let go of exhaustion and productivity as badges of honor made total sense to Steve and me, but putting Wholeheartedness into practice has been a struggle for our entire family.

Steve and I sat down in 2008 and made a practical list of the things that make our family work. We basically answered the question, "When things are going really well in our family, what does it look like?" The answers included sleep, working out, healthy food, cooking, time off, weekends away, going to church, being present with the kids, a sense of control over our money, meaningful work that doesn't consume us, time to piddle, time with family and close friends, and time to just hang out. These were (and are) our "ingredients for joy and meaning."

[Then they looked at their "dream list"] Everything required that we make more money and spend more money.

When we compared our dream list to our "joy and meaning" list, we realized that by merely letting go of the list of things we want to accomplish and acquire, we would be actually living our dream—not striving to make it happen in the future, but living it right now. The things we were working toward did nothing in terms of making our life fuller.

Embracing our "joy and meaning" list has not been easy. There are days when it makes perfect sense, and then there are days when I get sucked into believing how much better everything would feel if we just had a really great guest room or a better kitchen, or if I got to speak or write an article for that popular magazine... It was terrifying to me as a parent. What if I'm wrong? What if busy and exhausted is what it takes? What if [my child] doesn't get to go to the college of her choice because she doesn't play violin and speak Mandarin and French and she doesn't play six sports?

What if we're normal and happy? Does that count?

I guess the answer to this is only yes if it counts to us. If what matters to us is what we're concerned about, then play and rest is important. If what matters to us is what other people think or say or value, then it's back to exhaustion and producing for self-worth.

Brené Brown, The Gifts of Imperfection, 102-103 Today I choose play and rest.

One of the challenges of my sabbatical is to release guilt and receive its gifts: play and rest, undeserved, while others continue to work. Sabbath time always brings this challenge. I hope and pray that you and your family can go against the tide of our culture and choose some excellent play and rest this summer!

Here's a sampling of what I've learned from them and others:

Alice Muir smiled and said Bob and Rachel welcomed her and Alan warmly to Faith when they began ranching in the Bitterroot. Cheerful folks, always!



Carl Swanson recalled that Bob loved to learn and practice farming—science on the ground! Carl thinks Bob's regular visits to Swanson's operation, back then mostly beef cattle, kept him connected to his roots. Once Bob even brought a puppy he was watching for a friend and hauled it around on the tractor.

Nathan Brady noted Bob was innovative, even radical. He remembers that Bob was the first person to put song words on the wall—at a Christmas Eve worship service, maybe in the 80's?—probably using a slide projector.

Many remember how grateful Bob was in later years for recordings of the worship service delivered to him at The Discovery, and that he and Rachel passionately supported our kids and their continuing education.

What are your Gerloff stories? Please tell them—at the Coffee Cup or church, when you visit each others' homes, on break at RML . 



Words From the Bishop.....


Deepen faith and witness – We Are Lutheran

Presiding Bishop Elizabeth Eaton's second emphasis for the ELCA is: "We are Lutheran." We are members of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America.

We are a product of the Reformation that Martin Luther started.

Almost 500 years ago, Martin Luther, an obscure monk in northern Germany, challenged the religious hierarchy on matters of faith and practice. He wasn't the first to raise questions about how the church operated, but he raised his voice at an opportune time when many

others, including secular rulers, agreed with him. His voice was amplified by the new technology of the day-the printing press-and soon the words of this Augustinian friar were being read all over Europe.



The Reformation started a break between Catholics and Protestants that has persisted for half a millennium. Now, as we approach the 500th anniversary, Lutherans and Catholics are working together more closely. We are letting go of our 16th century condemnations of each other and seeking to find ways that we can work together, to affirm things that we have in common.

To that end, Lutherans and Catholics in Montana (and y'all in Wyoming are invited!) will have a service of commemoration on October 30, 2017, at the Helena Cathedral. Two Catholic and one Lutheran Bishop will be present to signify our commitment to Christian unity.

Being Lutheran does not mean that we are anti-Catholic. In fact, being Lutheran means that we seek Christian unity with any and all. That's why we have full communion agreements with 6 other denominations (Presbyterian, United Methodist, United Church of Christ, The Episcopal Church, Moravians, Reformed Church in America), and why we are part of ecumenical and interfaith organizations. When we say, "We are Lutheran," it means we know who we are and where we are coming from, so that we can speak with people of other backgrounds and other faiths, with confidence and integrity, but not arrogance.

Lutheranism is no longer a northern European phenomenon only. The Lutheran World Federation is made up of 145 member churches in 98 countries. Lutheranism is a global phenomenon, and its future is being shaped by churches like our companion churches in Bolivia and South Africa.

It is a great time to be Lutheran, to acknowledge our roots in the past and to marvel at the branches. ~~~Jessica Crist, Bishop

ELCA Presiding Bishop Issues Letter In Response to Orlando Shooting

The Rev. Elizabeth A. Eaton, presiding bishop of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA), has issued a letter in response to the June 12 shooting that claimed the lives of 49 people at a nightclub in Orlando, Fla. This is the deadliest mass shooting in U. S. history. In the letter Eaton states, "We must speak peace and reconciliation into the cacophony of hatred and division. We must live the truth that all people are created in God's image."

Eaton's letter follows:

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ.

"So God created humankind in his image, in the image of God he created them." Genesis 1:27

We are killing ourselves. We believe that all people are created in God's image. All of humanity bears a family resemblance. Those murdered in Orlando were not abstract "others," they are us. But somehow, in the mind of a deeply disturbed gunman, the LGBTQ community was severed from our common humanity. This separation led to the death of 49 and the wounding of 54 of **us**.

We live in an increasingly divided and polarized society. Too often we sort ourselves into like-minded groups and sort others out. It is a short distance from division to demonization. Yesterday, we witnessed the tragic consequences of this.

There is another way. In Christ God has reconciled the world to God's self. Jesus lived among us sharing our humanity. Jesus died for us to restore our humanity. God invites us into this reconciling work. This must be our witness as the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America. The perpetrator of this hate crime did not come out of nowhere. He was shaped by our culture of division, which itself has been misshapen by the manipulation of our fears. That is not who we are. St. Paul wrote, "So if anyone is in Christ, there is a new creation; everything old has passed away; see, everything has become new. All this is from God, who reconciled us to himself through Christ, and has given us the ministry of reconciliation; that is, in Christ God was reconciling the world to himself, not counting their trespasses against them, and entrusting the message of reconciliation to us. So we are ambassadors for Christ" (II Corinthians 5:17-20).

Our work begins now. We need to examine ourselves, individually and as a church, to acknowledge the ways we have divided and have been divided. We must stand with people who have been "othered". We must speak peace and reconciliation into the cacophony of hatred and division. We must live the truth that all people are created in God's image.

This morning your churchwide staff came together to mourn and to pray. We prayed for those killed in Orlando and remembered the Charleston Nine killed only a year ago. We prayed for the family of the shooter, for our LGBTQ brothers and sisters and for our Muslim brothers and sisters who now face the threat of retaliation. And we prayed that the Prince of Peace will bring us to the day when we stop killing ourselves.
