### On the Pastor's Heart: Why Nobody Wants to Go to Church Anymore (and what we might do about it)

Ok, so we don't like it, but many of us know in our hearts that something's not right between Christian churchgoers and non-churchgoing folk. And many of us feel something is missing in our own experiences at church, too. We just can't quite put our finger on it.

Thom and Joanie Schultz, founders of Group Publishing, one of American Christianity's most trusted youth and education sources, offer painfully honest and

deeply hopeful comment in *Why Nobody Wants to Go to Church Anymore* (and how 4 Acts of Love will make your church irresistible), © 2013, Group.

Leaning on polls from Gallup, Pew Research, their own work and many others', Schultz's report: of 350,000 congregations in the US, only 2,200 showed growth in 2012; churchgoers are older than the general population; the younger the generation, the lower the percentage who affiliate with a church; 4/5 Americans say they're sure God exists, but less than half attend church; giving in congregations is down across the board. If you want more stats, quotes, and anecdotes, there are plenty.

Now, lots of us church people get angry and afraid when faced with this stuff. It hurts! As when we cover our bodies with clothes, then find ourselves startled when we look in the mirror, church folk have been covering over, avoiding, and fighting anxiety over this for years. Now it's obvious.

But if any Christians are invited to be honest, it's Lutherans: "if we say we have no sin, we deceive ourselves..." we fearlessly confess. Schultz's write,

"We, as the church, need to admit we don't look that good. When others see us, they're not all that attracted to us and wonder why we don't make some changes. For our own good—and for their good, too. But like those of us carrying around unhealthy poundage, we're looking for someone else to blame: McDonald's, Ben and Jerry's, potato chip manufacturers, giant sodas, commercials, oversized restaurant portions—hey, we're big-boned! Like the overweight, we in the church like to shift the responsibility to something or someone else: declining morality, Sunday sports, bad parenting, bad attitudes, lack of commitment, the media, technology, busy schedules, the economy, Satan, unstable global influences, the Internet....

STOP! Blaming gets us nowhere. And it's pointing fingers in all the wrong directions.

One thing we've learned at Group Publishing is to train all our leaders to speak

the language of accountability. As a team, we read *The Oz Principle* together. It's all about building a culture of personal ownership and responsibility. We've learned a lot about how to address issues head on in a healthy, productive way.

The church must do this, too. And we've got to start by confessing that the church is broken. Say it with us: 'The church is broken.'"(16-17)

When Schultz's asked folks why they no longer attend church, answers grouped into four reasons (pp. 24-27):

1. "I feel judged." Fair or not, 87% of Americans label Christians as judgmental, ...critical, disapproving, condemning. When author Phil Yancey asked a single mom trying to get out of prostitution if she'd tried church, she said, "Church? I feel bad enough already!"

Yet people long for love and belonging. Could Faith love all people with **RADICAL HOSPITALITY**, unconditional acceptance? Can we really love others as they are and not as (we think) they should be? Do we want to?

2. "I don't want to be lectured." Schultz's find that all ages—from preschoolers to the elderly—want to engage in conversation. Sermons are mostly lectures, yet people have questions, doubts, stories; they want real connections and friendships and support.

Could Faith love all people in **FEARLESS CONVERSATIONS** that welcome each other's and strangers' thoughts, doubts, and insights in authentic conversation about issues that matter? Could we seek more to understand than to be understood?

**3.** "Church people are a bunch of hypocrites." In 2007, 85% of Americans thought this; I doubt it's changed. Religious folk often claim to know the "right" way try to impose it on others—when it's pretty obvious that Christians don't have our stuff together. Yet many people long to know that others struggle as they do, that they're not alone.

Could we love others with **GENUINE HUMILITY** that is honest and understanding on every level? Can kind-hearted and open sincerity become normal? Can church—or at least *this* church—become the least hypocritical and most compassionate community in America?

4. "Your God is irrelevant to my life. But I'd like to know a God who cares."

Research shows that most people don't actually experience the presence and power of God on Sundays at church. Do you? How? Schultz's write: "Relevance isn't the worship pastor showing his tattoo on stage. Relevance isn't serving fair-trade coffee in your lobby. Relevance isn't showing the latest popular movie clip during a sermon. True spiritual relevance is seeing God in the matters at hand. Seeing God in MY life."

All of us want to know that God exists and is at work in our lives. Could Faith love members and neighbors with **DIVINE ANTICIPATION** that God is always at work in you, me, others, and our world for real, deeply needed good? Can we become a community where we and others truly experience God in fresh ways—if not all the time, then much of it? Could we be "the most relevant place to go on Sunday?"

Friends of Faith, I believe that in Christ we deeply long to be people who practice these 4 Acts of Love: RADICAL HOSPITALITY, FEARLESS CONVERSATIONS, GENUINE HUMILITY, and DIVINE ANTICIPATION for ourselves and for the world. On Pentecost Sunday, I felt the Spirit inviting us all to a journey of greater engagement with God, each other, and our neighbors both inside and outside our building.



### In Worship: Intermountain Children's Home


Faith's VBS is excited to support ICH this summer with our gifts and offerings!

### Irish Potato Leek Soup

4c. chicken broth 3 potatoes

<sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub> c. chopped cabbage

1 diced leek

1 chopped onion

2 carrots

1 t. salt

3/4 t. caraway seeds

½ t. black pepper

1 bay leaf



### **Crock Pot 6-8 hours**

Mix together: ½ c. of liquid from crock pot and ½ c. sour cream. Add back in with 1 lb. bacon, crumbled and serve. ☺

### Seafood Chowder

½ c. butter

1 stalk celery

1 small onion

¼ t cayenne pepper

½ t thyme

¼ t marjoram


3 T. flour

3 cans condensed cream of potato soup (undiluted)

1 ½ lbs. seafood

Chopped fresh parsley

Sauté celery and onion in butter. Add pepper, thyme, marjoram, & flour. Stir until smooth. Clean and chop seafood as you like. Add milk and condenced soup to sauté mix and stir until piping hot. Add seafood and stir over medium heat till seafood is cooked through. Top with fresh parsley. (add oyster crackers if you want.)

### **May Council Highlights**

Karen Jakobsen was approved for membership.

Pastor Brenda was approved for the Renovaré Institute, personal and congregational spiritual formation. This 2-year program is part of her continuing education.

Electronic Sound and Percussion's proposal for a new digital sound system was accepted. Installation of the new system has begun.

The Community Meal program is on hiatus until the fall. There was a discussion that FLC participation in the program is underfunded, but it was unknown if FLC has the resources to increase funding at this time.

The new phone and internet system from Verizon is up and running. The copier lease from ABS has been modified to lease to own. The final contract should be in place by the end of June. The term will be \$155 per month 60 months.

### The "Other" Endowment

Most people with Faith Lutheran connections are aware of a very generous gift from the Robert and Rachel Gerloff Endowment. A sizeable amount of money is projected each year until 2037 to benefit the youth and musical ministry activities of the church.

However, there is another Endowment that is likely not as well known. It is the Faith Lutheran Endowment. While details are sketchy, it appears that about 20 years ago a gift of \$5,000 was made as the principle. That means that this amount has been invested each year earning interest which in turn is available for grant requests. Past Endowment Committee members did not proceed in that direction, likely since there was a rather

small amount and felt the interest needed to build up. Also, over the years there has been no addition funds added to increase the principle from the first, and only donation.

The current Endowment Committee is proposing the following two recommendations.

- 1. Encouraging members and Friends of Faith Lutheran to consider providing funds to the principle. While it may have been understood that it had to come from an estate or the death of someone, anyone at anytime may participate whether it be one time, annually, quarterly, or monthly. The amount is subject to donor's choice.
- 2. Invitation is extended for possible requests of accumulated interest funds. While Gerloff funds are restricted to music and youth, other areas of the church may consider this fund. Ideas may be equipment replacement, landscaping, minor building repair, etc. Total of funds is about \$5,200. (This does not include the \$5,000 that remains as principle.) Requests honored will likely be in the lower three figure totals unless we may see the principle amount increase as mentioned in the first recommendation.



### 2017 Montana Synod Assembly Highlights June 2-4, 2017 Great Falls

Faith's Voting Delegates: Rod Pogachar and Jennifer Murillo Also attending: Pastor Brenda Satrum, Celeste Pogachar Theme: Montana Synod's fourth benchmark: Promote Unity

Saturday workshops supported the theme: Disaster Preparedness, Women and Justice Social Statement, Small Church Network, My Neighbor the Refugee, Intermountain- Mental Health Issues for Children, to name a few.

Keynote Speaker: Dr. Michael Trice, Theme: Reconciled to God

Reports were given by the representatives of the various ministries supported by the Montana Synod (and you!) The new MSU Campus Minister, Kathleen, Larson Aashiem, was introduced.

2018 ELCA Youth Gathering will be held in Houston. Pastor Jason Asselstine will be coordinating a bus trip for Montana youth to take to and from Houston.

The Mission Builders will be working on the synod house this summer and they need your help. Volunteer labor will result in a significant cost savings and reduction of debt. They can use everybody with any ability, no experience necessary. Participants at the conference were invited to a free lunch at the synod house site. The old synod building has been sold. The monthly mortgage will be approximately \$3000. On-going fundraising efforts will hopefully lower this amount.

ELCA Vice President: Mr. William "Bill" Horne II was in attendance. He spoke on a number of issues. He presented a detailed churchwide annual report. He lifted up a study from the ELCA Task Force on Women and Justice: One in Christ. Faith, Sexism, Justice: Conversations toward a Social Statement. The response period runs until August 31, 2017.

Recognition Banquet: Carl Rohr & Don Melchert were recognized for celebrating their 50<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of Ordination.

Sunday morning, the assembly voted to adopt the proposed 2018 budget of \$1.089 million. Proposed amendments to the constitution were approved. A joyous Pentecost worship service led by Bishop Crist closed the assembly.
