Dear Members and Friends of Faith Lutheran Church,

It's hard to believe that we've had our first snow of the season, that we've weathered below zero temperatures already, and this is all before we've even turned our clocks back an hour, and even before Halloween.

We continue to fight the COVID virus with numbers on the rise here in Ravalli County, and election day is right around the corner with people on opposite sides. Our Bishop, Bishop Laurie, from the Montana synod, while standing on the deck of one of the buildings at Flat Head Lutheran Bible Camp, talked about living in tumultuous times while the wind was violently blowing and white caps from the lake were clearly visible as the water crashed into the beach front. The weather around the Bishop was a great analogy of how our world around us may be feeling right now.

But in the midst of this, Bishop Laurie encourages us to practice defiant joy. Defiant joy, the Bishop says, "comes from our African Brothers and Sisters, who in the midst of slavery, in the midst of segregation, and Jim Crow—they came together and they celebrated, they practiced defiant joy. They experienced God's presence in their lives even in the midst of all their suffering." These people would gather as a community worshiping and celebrating God's presence.

Our church community comes together and practices this defiant joy, of which we all hunger. Whether it be virtually, or behind masks, social distancing and using hand sanitizer liberally, we come together to practice this defiant joy, praising God for God's presence in our lives always. The joy of the Lord is our strength amidst these times. May we continue to hold one another in prayer during these times.

I leave you with 2 prayers from our Evangelical Lutheran Book of Worship page 76. *Faith Lutheran Church is a family of God built on love: Worshiping, welcoming, and serving in Christ's name.*



FLBC Annual Meeting Report

FLBC Annual Meeting Report FLBC 2020 Annual Meeting Delegate Report


We recently attended the Flathead bible Camp annual meeting as your voting delegates. From the moment we arrived, it became evident of their passion and will to keep this wonderful camp vibrant during this challenging time. The Leadership and Board were forced to pivot in March to the chaos we have all experienced with the pandemic.

We all know this is a special place and this year was no exception, although different. To make the best out of 2020, the Board and Staff had to totally rework their entire program. In 2019, 4500 youth attended the camp. In 2020, it was only 600. Leadership transitioned to allow families and small groups to grow in faith. There were many encouraging stories of how multigenerational experiences occurred during this time with reworked camp options. With the reduced number of campers, the revenue was significantly reduced. The shortfall in campership revenue was \$482,000 from fewer youth. Knowing efforts must be made, Margie, Board and Staff eliminated expenses where doable then utilized available grant funding. From their efforts to trim and obtain funding, the short fall to the projected budget is \$201,000. Even with this shortfall, FLBC has a strong balance sheet and exceedingly small debt. Camp is still strong financially.

Another one-of-a-kind opportunity presented itself to FLBC. Several decades ago, FLBC obtained the "first right of refusal" to purchase the adjoining lake front property on Hughes Bay. The first right had been forgotten over the years but was discovered by the title company during their process of a sale to a private individual. This individual buying the land, planned to build a home on this lot with 100 feet of lake frontage. FLBC was notified just prior to the annual meeting that FLBC had the option to buy this property at the price the homeowner had negotiated. However, FLBC had a 15-day window to accept or deny this offer. We were so blessed that this option was discovered with the annual meeting already planned. There was considerable discussion, but we all realized this was a once in a lifetime opportunity even if the timing was not ideal. After questions and discussion, the Board and Delegates unanimously approved \$287,500 to purchase this property. The payment will come from a loan from the endowment funds. From discussion, we suspect there will be a capital campaign to fund this purchase.

Additionally, at the Annual meeting Bishop Jungling spoke on how God's love fills each of us and the importance of love in everything we do. At the conclusion of the meeting, Kyle Lefler, FLBC Associate Director, was celebrated for her dedication and passion at Camp. She was sent off with many prayers for her next adventure working with young women.


Ski & Snowboard Retreat

The Operation Christmas Child Packing Party Begins

Christmas for all of us will likely be different this year than years before but the reason we celebrate will always be the same...the birth of Jesus. Sharing this joyous event and God's love is the basis for the Operation Christmas Child (OCC) shoeboxes. It's important to keep sharing this message of God's love through shoeboxes even during this time of Covid.



Here's the plan for the Faith OCC shoeboxes that will be the alternative to our usual Sunday party with food and group fellowship. The OCC On-Going Party will start November 1^{st} and end November 15^{th} . The Party "packing line" will be set up in the church Fellowship room. Individuals, families, and "pods" of friends who feel safe together can come to the church during business hours and pack boxes. Church business hours are Monday through Thursday from 9 am – 1 pm. Please follow the precautions required for in-building services of wearing masks, sanitizing, and maintaining social distance as much as possible. Bring any items you may have to put in your box(es) and follow the directions that will be posted along the packing line. Our goal is to pack *at least* 100 boxes. Obviously, coming to the church during the business hours will not work for everyone, so, you can arrange time outside business hours or weekends by calling or texting Linda Beyer (406-207-3471) or Karen Heller (406-360-1208).

And like every year, you can pick up an empty box(es) at the church and pack it/them at home and then return them to our church or at the Drop Off Center (usually the Cornerstone Bible Church on Fairgrounds Rd). Collection week is November 16 - 23.


