Dear leaders of Faith Lutheran,

The gifts he gave were that some would be apostles, some prophets, some evangelists, some pastors and teachers, to equip the saints for the work of ministry, for building up the body of Christ, until all of us come to the unity of the faith, and of the knowledge of the Son of God, to maturity, to the measure of the full stature of Christ. "
Ephesians 4:11-13

I give thanks for the ongoing witness that you offer in your congregation and community to share the good news of Jesus' love and compassion in your context! Together, Lutherans here in the Montana Synod and across the whole ELCA are working to meet the challenges of this time with creativity and courage. As a part of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America, your congregation stands in partnership with the wider church and the Montana Synod as various changes have taken place over the past years.

Currently, under the leadership of Bishop Laurie Jungling, the Synod council and staff are focused on equipping congregations and individuals for ministry, for building up the body of Christ. As the whole church works together, we are all stronger and more able to faithfully proclaim and witness to the love and grace of God! Thank you for your continued partnership through which together we equip disciples for ministry in congregations to be followers of Jesus.

There are many challenges before us as Christ's church. There is a shortage of trained clergy to lead congregations. We have been exploring how to be church during a pandemic and all of us have been affected in countless ways. Many areas in our territory are challenged by drought and fires and their economic impact.

But I am certain that the God who has blessed and strengthened the church through the centuries will continue to nurture the church and God's people today and into the future. The reality is that the future will not look like it has in the past. But by God's grace, let us enter into these days with courage and with confidence, that God's love and support will sustain us.

Here in the Montana Synod, I am working with leaders to begin a process of "Faithful Innovation" to help congregations listen intentionally to God, to one another and to their community and then to conduct experiments to seek to learn about what they have been hearing in their community. The first few congregations will be completing the process by the end of the summer and congregations are being invited to enter into the next cohort that will begin in the fall. Might your congregation be a candidate for this process?

There is a second pilot project underway to help congregations rethink and reimagine stewardship and generosity through "Fed By Ravens", a process again to help clergy and lay leaders ponder how giving and



generosity are central to being followers of Jesus and not something to be dreaded, ignored or dismissed. There will be a new cohort of congregations beginning to engage the process in the fall. Look for more information about how to get involved.

The plan now is that each of these processes will be offered for groups of congregations regularly in the coming years. And the plan is that most, if not all of these will be held over Zoom, so that there are no geographical barriers to participate! Please reach out to me if you are interested in participating in either the Faithful Innovation or Fed By Ravens processes.

I encourage you/your congregation to consider your own giving to further the work of the whole church through your mission support to the Montana Synod. The work in which the Synod staff, the Synod Council and other leaders in the Synod are engaged means that you and your congregation do not walk alone. Thank you for the generosity from your congregation that you have supplied in this fiscal year. And thank you for considering how your congregation can join in the ministry to equip one another for ministry so that we all share in the Gospel of Jesus Christ.

Quarterly Report from the Endowment Committee

As of 7/2/21 the Doris Koch Memorial Endowment Fund had a total of \$102,965.55 as a balance and the Faith Lutheran Endowment Fund had a balance of \$16,215.42 as a balance.

The Endowments Distribution Account had a balance of \$ 20,899.08 at the beginning of April 2021. A disbursement was made of \$10,000.00 to the Parking Lot Fund. A disbursement of \$2,124.90 was made to update the sound system of the church on 6/15/21. This left a balance of \$8,774.18 in the Endowments Distribution Fund.

A transfer will be made from the two Endowment Funds to the Endowments Distribution Account in the near future that will bring the Doris Koch Memorial Endowment Fund to a balance of \$100,000.00 and a balance of \$15,000.00 in the Faith Lutheran Endowment Fund. The amounts transferred will depend on the balances in the 2 funds at time of transfer. If you have any questions see Carl Russ or John Trangmoe

Dale left his earthly body, recently to his eternal rest in heaven. Beginning earlier this year Dale began experiencing some changes and increasing medical situations. He was preparing for whatever God's plan would be for him, He would account on occasion about his childhood experiences of farm life in central Montana in the 30's and 40's during the drought and depression times and adding to the fact he was the 13th child of his large family. He was married 62 years to his loving wife Clarice. Their children are Lynda Brady, Lori (David) Swenson and Nathan (Amanda) Brady. He is survived by two brothers Alby and Lyall. Dale loved children and will be greatly missed by grandchildren, great-grandchildren and many nieces and nephews.



Dale's main occupation was the management of grocery stores in other Montana towns before moving to Hamilton and establishing the Main Street Market and as a result getting to know many residents and longtime friends. After leaving the grocery store it did not stop Dale from continuing to make new acquaintances. It is beyond anyone's guess to how many hours Dale gave to his church, Faith Lutheran Church, over the years. His last position as the Steward of

the Property and Grounds Committee was dedicated to replacing the 30+ year old church parking lots. He decided it was time, after he found himself mowing the grass and pulling weeds growing in the cracks of the pavement. Just prior to his death he prepared the project for the bidding process. Construction is now complete, and I bet Dale was observing the action from his heavenly view.

The celebration of life at Faith Lutheran Church on May 17th was evidence of the respect and love for Dale from his family, church friends and community members filling the church to capacity. The beautiful service was even more meaningful with floral arrangements of plants from Dale's greenhouse, and a chorus of Ultreya folks singing Dale's favorite "Alba Father" from his previous participation in the Cursillo movement.

There are folks in our congregation who are here because of Gail and Sylvia Lewis. Their love for their students shined in whatever they did. At Faith Gail served the church council and headed up several call committees. He was active on the building committee when we moved to our new facility in 1983. He and his friend Bill Delaney were cabinet builders after their retirement from teaching, and they constructed many of the ones that hold all the supplies at Faith.

She told me she was interested in the origins of Faith's rose garden so I'm including a bit of history here. Many years ago the beautiful landscaping at Faith initiated by Charley and Judy Larson that contained wonderful shrubbery was outgrowing its boundaries. Weeds had taken over some of the berms and it was being noticed. Four women of the church took a special interest and decided they could make a difference. Shirley Seman, Shirley McGourty, Karla West and myself met several mornings at 6:30 a.m. with spades and buckets ready for attack. It was amazing how quickly Faith's grounds looked different.

When we came to the area around the cross, the shrubbery was especially overgrown and the then Property and Grounds Steward Jack Wigen said we could have it removed and replace it with our dream rose garden. Pooling our rose knowledge, the group went to work. I personally learned so much from Ed Grimes whose roses often graced our altar. Planting and pruning and cutting correctly and when to do it are important. The area was mapped out with paving stones leading to the cross and designed spots for the bushes. Roses were purchased by individuals as memorials for loved ones who were members and attendees of Faith. There was a schematic in the office that unfortunately has been lost. The bench was purchased by Marilyn Hoblitt as a memorial to her mother, Bea Nelson. Through the years since, the berm shrubbery has been removed and replaced with grass. That solved most of the weed problem. Some of the roses

have gone 'wild' now and need to be replaced. Claudia will oversee that happening. Watch for more information coming from her.

She has promised to let me 'help' because I have long loved those roses.

Wednesday Night Alive!

With council's permission we are back September 8 and we have plans, hopes, and faith. We pray that we may hear the voice of the Spirit so that we may follow their voice and we certainly expect some of that input to be voiced by members of FLC. As this is an activity sponsored by our Discipleship ministry we are going to reshape some aspects of Wednesday evenings to better equip FLC in their personal and the church's ongoing mission of discipleship. Often, in the past, Discipleship has been primarily interpreted as "education" I believe we need to move beyond that narrow concept. Matthew 28:19-20 sets the path for all future disciples.



¹⁹ Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, ²⁰ and teaching them to obey everything that I have commanded you. And remember, I am with you always, to the end of the age.

Disciples are called and directed to make more disciples, evangelize. In my experience many Christians feel ill prepared to evangelize. What do we say? To whom do we say it? Where and when is it appropriate? And the ever popular "I'm not really comfortable evangelizing, don't we have a person or committee for that"?

It is not our intention to create a herd of evangelizing door to door warriors. It is our intention to equip the disciple to be a better disciple. The most important thing a disciple does is to act as a steward of the Gospel, so evangelism an important trait of a disciple. What are other traits? A prayerful and prayer led life, worship, mission work, charity in service and word, and education. I'm sure you can think of a couple items to add to the list. We hope you do and you tell us.

Prayer is foundational to all that we do as Christians. To that end, our first unit for WNA! is a book club approach to Richard Foster's Prayer: Finding the Heart's True Home. R. Foster is a very accessible and knowledgeable writer. In this book he walks the disciple through various ways of praying. Our first time out and first time back at this I'm not convinced we will benefit from structured lesson plans. Let us explore the realms of prayer together.

The next unit in the works is an exploration of women in of the Bible. We are going to try to keep the unit's length manageable for the benefit of those learning, those leading, and FLC's church calendar. After these two we are on our knees praying that the people of FLC will tells us what they want to explore and expand on.

We hope and pray that the Men's ministry that carried the weight of providing the meal is ready and willing to jump back into the fray. We hope and pray you find the time to join your FLC family in a journey of disciple formation and of course FOOD!. Wednesday Night Alive! Every Wed evening, dinner between 5:30-6:30, disciple formation 6 – 7:30. Remember Jesus' words *"I am with you always, to the end of the age"* - John Marten
