You've shared the gifts of your voices as we've tried to discover and learn how God is calling us to be the church now and into the future. Congregational Budget Meeting Minutes December 10, 2023

The meeting was called to order at 11:20 am by Council President/Convener - *Jacque VanDenburg*.

50 Members were present: See appendix A—found in the church office

Jacque VanDenburg, Council President, started the meeting explaining the difference between special funds such as Quilter's, Funeral, and Scandinavian Dinner, etc. do not appear in the proposed yearly budget. These are funds set aside for special purposed and not budgeted line items.

Faith Lutheran Council Steward of Property & Grounds - John Marten gave a report on the work done thus far for the Furnace Update:

- A. Anderson's quoted two 96% efficient three stage furnaces, one for sanctuary and one for office/kitchen at \$10,250 per unit for a total of \$20,500.
- B. Anderson's quoted one 80% efficient single stage furnace for \$5,980.
- C. Anderson's quoted on 1.5 ton central cooling system (FWIW, the kitchen and the office spaces are connected) for \$9,480.
- D. Total for all = \$35,960

Faith Lutheran Council Steward of Finance – Sandy Russ placed the proposed 2024 budget on the overhead projector screen and went through each line of the proposed budget, see approved budget in the Annual Report.

January 3, 2024

New Year's Greetings to you who are part of the Body of Christ in the Montana/N. Wyoming Synod, ELCA! Welcome to 2024!!

As I reviewed my annual report letters from the previous four years, I noticed a common theme — Change! Transition! Adapt! I'm guessing some of you are getting tired of all the talk about change and calls to adapt, and would just appreciate some stability right now. Others of you may be hoping and praying for more change or at least certain kinds of change to come to your lives, your congregation, your community, this nation and even the world. I know I am praying for a transformation from relentless violence and polarization to persistent peace and collaboration across all of human society.

And yet change is upon us whether we want it or not. We can't escape change because to live is to go through change, many changes in fact. So as much as we may wish for stability, our lives as individuals, church and world are changing.

One thing we often forget, though, is that we do have some choice in how things change and that God is constantly active in the change, working toward the new life given in Jesus Christ no matter how much we resist in our bondage to sin. We can choose how we approach change – in faith rather than fear – and we can choose to follow the lead of God's Spirit of Love rather than the hate-filled voices of anger that want to keep us fighting with one another.

In our gospel lesson from John for the second Sunday of Epiphany, Jesus says to Philip, "Follow me" and Philip says to Nathanael, "Come and See." What if during 2024, we as followers of Christ deliberately practiced these two phrases? What if we intentionally sought out ways of coming to see what God is up to in our churches and communities? What if we purposely sought out old and new ways to follow Jesus in our lives of faith and works of love?

What would you and your congregation do first and then next? And what are ways that we as the Synod equip each other in the ministry of the gospel as we "walk the way together" across Montana and Northern Wyoming?

One guide might be the "Vision, Calling and Values" Statement for the Synod which I introduced at the 2023 Synod Assembly. Here they are again:

Montana/N. Wyoming Synod: Vision, Calling, Values
"...to equip the saints for the work of ministry, for building up the body of Christ...(Eph 4:12)
(Please see the video Bible study on this text on the Montana Synod website www.montanasynod.org)

Vision

A Montana/N Wyoming Synod who is continuously building up and equipping one another for the ministry of the Gospel of Jesus Christ in people's lives, their communities, the synod, the wider church and God's world.

Calling

Equipping the followers of Christ of the Montana/N Wyoming Synod for ministry of:

- 1) Building Up the Body of Christ; AND
- 2) Living Christ's Love into the World

Values

- 1. Proclaiming the Good News of Jesus Christ's Grace and Love for All
- 2. Engaging in God's Justice for the World, especially the "least of these" (Mt 25)
- 3. "Walking Humbly with God"-in all we do and say (Micah 6:8)
- 4. Pursuing "Unity in Harmony with Diversity" across church and community
- 5. Promoting Relationships and Collaboration across the synod and wider church

How can we as individuals, congregations and a synod put these into practice in various ways in our particular contexts? How can we support one another in this work of equipping through sharing our time, prayers, energy, and resources?

Over the next 12 months there will be changes coming to the synod including opportunities to participate in equipping one another for ministry. One example is the Montana Synod Assembly, held May 31-June 1, 2024 in Billings, during which we will explore together the theme "Equipping for *Doing* Justice." Other changes will include the arrival of a new Director for Evangelical Mission, some upgrades to the LPA program, and more resources for discerning as a congregation where God may be calling you to go in the future as well as what it looks like to do a Holy Closure of a congregation in a healthy, legacy-leaving way.

As we consider what God has in mind for us in 2024, I want to take this opportunity to say "Thank You!" for the ongoing generosity many of you have shown through your mission support and other gifts you have been willing and able to share. These gifts are deeply appreciated! As you are exploring your own financial realities for the coming year, I invite you to consider increasing your support as you are able in the service of the Christ's ministry across the synod.

May God bless you with the faith, hope, and love of Christ during 2024!

The finances of Faith Lutheran Church have become challenging with the age of our church. I greatly appreciate the giving of each of our members. I know sometimes it can seem difficult, but you did well as always. The chart will show our income and outgo for the year.

The 2024 budget has been approved and the expected income and expenses are:

Our Thrivent Funds saw an increase of \$32,371.65. Part of that includes a one-time deposit of \$13,000 to the Scholarship fund. The increase in the Faith Lutheran Endowment fund has recovered and there will be some dollars the Endowment Committee can utilize.

In 2024 we anticipate the need to start replacing furnaces. We have a quoted cost of \$35,960. This includes 3 furnaces. Also adding air conditioning for kitchen and the office areas.

2023 Outreach Activities

"Love Day" Quilters

The Love Day Quilters meet to assemble quilts the first and third (plus any fifth) Wednesdays of each month. The quilts become local and world-wide outreach from our congregation.

In May 2023, 106 quilts were shipped to the Lutheran World Relief clearinghouse in Minnesota. In addition, 20 personal care kits and 10 school kits were also sent. Eight quilts were given to Faith's graduating High School seniors and 20 quilts were given to the local Salvation Army to help our unhoused population. Another 3 were given directly to individuals in need. Two seasonal themed quilts were auctioned before Christmas with the proceeds going to S.A.F.E. And, at the present time, there are another 70+ completed for the next shipping date. Anyone is welcome to attend the quilting sessions to help with making these quilts – no special skills are required.

Community Meals (sponsored by the Family Shelter of the Bitterroot)

Faith Lutheran has participated in the Community Meals program since its inception in 2013. We serve the meal on the 4th Tuesday of the month during the months of the year meals are served. We prepare meals at Faith in the early afternoon and then transport and serve the meals at the Cornerstone Church on Fairgrounds Road. We usually serve 68-75 Dine-In and Take Out meals each time we serve. In addition, any leftover food at the end of the meal is taken to the Massa Youth Home. Donations of time, money, and/or Thrivent Action Team assistance are appreciated to keep this helpful program viable.

Operation Christmas Child Shoeboxes (Samaritan's Purse)

Operation Christmas Child (OCC) Shoeboxes share God's love and the Christmas story with children around the world. This year Faith Lutheran Church members packed a total of 150 shoeboxes. A "Combo Party" was once again available with one week of an "On-Going" Packing Line allowing individuals and family groups to safely come to the church and fill shoeboxes. Then, an "After-Church" party that included food and fellowship happened at the end of that week. This Party is always an enjoyable multigenerational fellowship opportunity. Donations of filler items for shoeboxes and/or money to help with this outreach ministry are welcome all year long. Boxes can also be packed online by going to the Samaritan's Purse website. Golden Group

The Golden Group made up of retired and/or mostly retired members of our congregation continued with social, educational, and charitable activities. An email communication labeled the "Golden Group Scoop" is sent periodically to share info and activity ideas. This year activities included a salmon lunch, Lowell Baltz sharing his Peace Corp experience, Stefanie Silvan presented tips for "downsizing" a household, and a morning session where scarves & hats were made for distribution to those in need in the community. The Golden Group is an opportunity for those who do not work full time to share in fellowship. There are no membership rules or expectation and *anyone* of a more "mature" J age is welcome!

KOGUDUS RENEWAL MINISTRY (2023 Annual Report to the Montana Synod)

The K.R.M. Board of Directors and I thank the Montana Synod and all who have supported this retreat ministry in 2023 and previous years. As a ministry partner K.R.M. began in 1976 under the leadership of Rev. Olaf Magis who had begun Kogudus retreats in 1969 while he was a pastor of First Lutheran Church in Glasgow, MT. The Estonian word, Kogudus, means "Christian fellowship". Olaf chose that word to convey the **message of Christ, fellowship in Christ,** and **service for Christ** to describe this ministry. Kogudus retreats have been held throughout the U.S. and in other countries. In recent years, however, retreats have been held in Montana and Illinois.

The original retreat called "Faith and Life" is a study of the Apostles' Creed and the New Testament Greek words for various kinds of servants. It inspires those who attend to discern their Godgiven gifts and consider how the Holy Spirit calls them to put those gifts to use for the common good of Christ's Church and the world. Another retreat, "Lament and Laughter", was introduced in 2011. It connects our losses to the cross and our joys to the resurrection. Dying and rising in Christ (daily baptism) is experienced at this retreat and encouraged as a daily spiritual practice.

"Contrast Community" was introduced in 2014. It is a retreat inspired by Dr. James L. Bailey's book by that name and focuses on the Sermon on the Mount. "Sojourners in Recovery" was developed in 2003 and was first offered at Flathead Lutheran Bible Camp for those recovering from chemical or other dependencies. It connects the 12 Steps of Alcoholics Anonymous and other recovery programs with their Biblical basis to offer spiritual support and guidance to Christians and others who seek sobriety and serenity. Family members of those in recovery (or not in recovery) are encouraged to take part as well.

"Blessed to Be a Blessing" is the most recently developed retreat. It was offered at both state prisons in Montana in 2022. The focus of this retreat is on Christian stewardship. It may also be adapted for use in congregations. The format is the same at most Kogudus events: small group Bible study, three presentations, large group sharing, creative worship, lively singing, and joke telling.

Two retreats were held in Montana in 2023. "Sojourners in Recovery" was used at Montana Women's Prison in Billings September 29-October 1. Twenty inmates took part; and nine team members from around the state led the retreat. The same curriculum was offered at Montana State Prison in Deer Lodge November 3-5. Twenty inmates attended and eight team members led. This included Marlow Carrels, Pastor of Freedom in Christ Ministry. Inmates at both prisons expressed gratitude and enthusiasm for being able to take part. Their responses were evident in their singing, sharing, poster making, and written evaluations. Numerous inmates have shared over the years how grateful they are to be treated with love and acceptance as fellow siblings in Christ.

"Faith and Life for Men" was held as a one-day event February 18 at St. John's Lutheran Church in Royal, Illinois. Jay Johnson hosted and served at the Retreat Pastor. Twenty men took part from various communities throughout the state.

2023 Annual Report to Congregations

Emmaus Campus Ministry continues to thrive as an ELCA ministry working in partnership with the Episcopal, United Church of Christ, and Methodist congregations and denominations. Emmaus is a community living in the vision of Jesus' radical love and dignity for all people and life. Emmaus is a Reconciling in Christ group which means it is open and affirming to people of all gender and sexual identities and strives towards racial justice and equality in our world.

Student residents and staff: We currently have housing for 15 students living in three different houses including the Ark, Emmaus House, and the Wesley House. We have about 25-30 students or young adults who are active in some way with us. We have a new full-time campus pastor, Pastor Eric Huseth, who comes to us from serving over 8 years at Our Saviors Lutheran Church in Bonner, MT! Along with that, we have two new part-time staff members who were hired onto the Emmaus team in 2023. Caleb Koebble is our new property manager who will be handling property maintenance as well as strategic improvements. In addition, Terecita Baker joins Emmaus as our new Office Manager and will help with communications, student outreach, and social media.

A New Era of Funding and Financial Sustainability for Campus Ministry: 2023 saw a continued trend of transition for Emmaus and campus ministry organizations nationwide. With large funding cuts continuing to happen at the national church level in many denominations, Emmaus has seen significant cuts to its funding from national church bodies and has had to be creative in its ministry. Being in transition this past year allowed our organization to absorb several of these major funding source decreases in 2023, and our organization will need to be intentional in 2024 with growing a more diverse and sustainable revenue stream. Luckily as Emmaus rides upon the foundation of Pastor John Lund's vision of being a student residence as well as student community, we will continue to see opportunities for funding in rental income, grants, and community generosity. Pastor Eric is determined to creatively grow Emmaus' donor base in 2024 while radically ministering Jesus' love to university students and the broader Missoula area. Emmaus Campus Ministry needs YOU now more than ever to be involved and know that your gifts will make a HUGE difference for our organization.

Student Programs: The heart of our student group is our weekly dinner sessions on Wednesday nights during the semester with an average of about 15-20 students. These sessions always consist of cooking and sharing a meal with one another as well as rotating between a worship/ritual activity and discussion/presentation topic. We hosted a winter retreat in Georgetown, traveled to Vancouver BC for a spring break/service learning trip, went rafting and hiking over the summer, as well as held a fall retreat at Flathead Lutheran Bible Camp. We also have taken on a number of local service projects throughout the year. 2024 is looking fun and busy as we are gearing up for a winter retreat in February and a spring break/ service learning trip to San Francisco, CA!

Confluence: Having existed for almost 10 years in several formats and versions, Confluence has built a significant following and foundation of community support. Thanks to the very capable leadership of Pastor Rebekah Cochrane, Karin Craven, Colter Murphy and others, this ministry is now standing on its own legs without needing significant resources from Emmaus as it has previously. Starting January 1st, 2024 Confluence will officially separate from the Emmaus Campus Ministry organization and will become its own ministry and 501c3. Though Pastor Eric will remain on the leadership team and students from Emmaus will continue to be involved, we are tremendously excited about this new chapter for Confluence! One of the purposes of Emmaus is to be an organization that allows new ideas of the church to come to life and Confluence is a significant example of how this mission can be successful! Praise God!

Community Outreach and Programs: Even in a transition year, Emmaus Campus Ministry has continued to be a bridge for students to connect with the broader Missoua community. Our Faith and Climate Action (FCAM) program, made up of both community members and students, has been active throughout 2023. Through grant funding from Humanities MT and support from various community groups, they hosted a variety of voices and perspectives including Dr. Beth Schenk, the Executive Director of Environmental Stewardship for Providence Health; Dr. Christopher Preston, Professor of Environmental Philosophy from the University of Montana; Bob Quinn, author and founder of Montana Flour and Grains, Inc.; and CSKT Tribal Chairman, Tom McDonald.

Emmaus was also a co-sponsor this autumn of a large and well received interfaith vigil for peace in Israel Palestine that was attended by several hundred students and community members. Under new leadership, we will continue to be intimately connected to social justice and ways to witness Jesus' love for the world publically. Through this commitment, Emmaus will continue to be a partner and model justice in 2024.

Buildings and Grounds: Minor updates to all the properties were completed this summer including new thermostats, wiring for internet, and painting. A new lock and keypad system was installed in all properties. Emmaus continues its close and positive partnership with Wesley House and will manage and coordinate needed maintenance on those houses in the coming year. Pastor Eric and Caleb will apply for grant funding for more major renovations and improvements in 2024.
